

**ERRATA and updates for the second edition of *The Rockwell Family in Fairfield County, Connecticut, and beyond*, by Kenneth W. Rockwell (2008)**

R8 (p. 40): Daughter Elizabeth Jones lived in *Dansville*, one of the six original towns of Steuben County. (The deed I quoted may have dropped the “s” but this is the proper spelling.) That large town was later divided between Steuben and Livingston counties when latter was created; Steuben still has the Town of Dansville, but the village of Dansville is in the Town of North Dansville, Livingston County.

R35 (p. 87): Joseph Rockwell was the son of Simeon by his unknown first wife.

R41 (p. 99): Phoebe Mallory was born ca. 1805, not 1855.

R76 (p. 142): Reuben Rockwell’s wife Urania was born on 7 April 1772, the daughter of Josiah Keeler and Elizabeth Stebbins. Benjamin Barberry was her step-father. Her brother, also Josiah Keeler, settled in Galway, N.Y., by 1804 [PW 215], and was probably instrumental in Reuben and Urania’s move there a few years later.

R92 and R93 (p. 181): I made reference to Justus and William’s “cousin” Mary (Rockwell) Bedient. She was their sister.

R132 (p. 207): While Boughton refers to his place of birth as being Hancock, Massachusetts, it is more likely that the place was Hancock, Addison Co., Vermont

R181 (p. 269): Note 4 should read, “New York Supreme Court records, 7:309–319; FHL Film #1008491.” Also, son Silas (p. 270) lived in Huntington Township, Ross Co., Ohio, in 1880. The youngest child listed (Albert F./Alvred, 1 in 1870 and 10 in 1880) was a grandson surnamed Malen.

R213 (p. 305): Son Edward’s son George did not die in 1871; rather, that was the year of his marriage, to Lucinda Dudgeon. See the website for his 1931 obituary.

R231 (p. 329): Daughter Catherine’s husband was Meyers Van Zandt, a financier in the timber trade. Their home, built by her grandfather Jeremy Rockwell as a wedding gift in 1885, is now the Saratoga Rose Inn and Restaurant inn in Hadley. [Source: the Inn’s web page.] Daughter Anna married her sister’s father-in-law, L. Y. Gardiner, after his first wife’s death. They had one child. Proper spelling for that surname is “Gardiner,” rather than the “Gardner” I used in the index. This from Anita Dingman, descendant of Anna.

R244 (p. 344): Note 4 should not read “ibid.” but instead read, “Erie Co. [Ohio] record of marriages, 5:16.

R261 (p. 364): A stray, incomplete line about having two children should be omitted.

R269: Lewis and Belinda’s son Charles may have moved east to New Jersey. A Charles Rockwell with English-born wife Jane lived in Landis, Cumberland Co., New Jersey, at the time of the 1870 census. They had a 10-year old son, also Charles, who was born in Wisconsin! See the website for further on this family.

R277 (p. 380): Obituaries for S. S. Rockwell and wife were from Vermontville Public Library, not Wisconsin Historical Society.

U16 (p. 403): Justus Rockwell’s visit to New York was in the 1880s, not 1890s; he died in 1887.

In several instances, my source code for details coming from the Ridgefield vital records, book 2, had an inadvertent extra “2” so as to read [RfVR 22:(p. no.)] No such volume exists.
